President's Report

I spent the last weekend in February in Edmonton attending the 73rd annual Alberta Fish and Game Association Conference along with five other delegates from our club for 3 days of grueling meetings.

A number of resolutions were presented. The one of greatest interest called for the Alberta Conservation Association (ACA) to be dissolved and to have that portion of hunting and angling licenses which presently goes to them placed in a government administered trust fund for the benefit of fish and wildlife habitat and enhancement projects. The resolution was defeated by a narrow margin. It appears that a majority of fish and game members want to give ACA another chance to correct some of the funding problems that exist. The two major problems are; a) that those dollars contributed by anglers and hunters are not being used for fish and wildlife as originally designated, and; b) directors have been appointed by our government to administer millions of dollars of our money who do not contribute to the fund.

Another issue is game farming of elk and deer and the subsequent appearance of Chronic Wasting Disease in game farmed cervids. Saskatchewan recently had to kill 7,500 elk in diseased herds there. They also found the disease in wild deer near the Alberta border and, as a result, have killed hundreds of them. It is only a matter of time till this devastating disease crosses our borders. Now the game farmers are pressuring our government to permit penned shooting of these animals for profit. Wealthy Americans are the target. Minister Cardinal advised that this issue will be voted on by caucus. Well, in view of the fact that some cabinet ministers and families of some cabinet ministers have been game farming since 1987, I don't expect a totally unbiased vote. It will be passed and the same old response will be "we have done what most Albertans want". Also in preparation, they took game farming of our indigenous wildlife away from the fish and wildlife ministry and transferred it to the ministry of agriculture and declared that fenced elk and deer are no longer wildlife. There are presently about 600 game farms in the province using land that once harbored wild deer and elk. Where do we go from here? I will start by writing a letter to the Premier, my MLA, the Minister of Sustainable Resources (Fish & Wildlife) and the Minister of Agriculture. I encourage all of you to do the same.

2002 Pheasant Projects

We will again be involved with the **Spring Brooder Hen** release project in mid March. We hope to raise enough funds from donations to release 8 hens and possibly 1 cock into numerous areas where there presently are pheasants. We are concerned about releasing these more domesticated but in better shape birds into winter cover with hungry predators where there aren't any "teachers". If you would like to donate to this project, or if you have an area where you would like birds, please call Art Yeske at 249-7245 or Art Beck at 274-5924. We hope to make this project no cost for SF&GA.

Our proven method of **Raise & Release** will again be the main part of our Pheasant Projects. (In the last 2 years we have had hatches of wild birds in essentially all of the areas where we raised and released birds by the open-pen-door method.) Our original raisers are looking forward to getting 6 week old chicks near the end of June. We have several interested people where others may build the pens or they supply the materials and the SF&GA to provide the manpower. This would greatly reduce our costs and would release more birds to more areas. I would like to target 500 pheasants to be raised and released per year.

We will also release **Proven Brooder Hens** in July or August.

There is a slight chance that we may receive some funding for the bird programs from Alberta Conservation Assoc. (ACA) and/or Hunters for Tomorrow (HFT).

Some Notes and Trivia From the Conference:

- Our AFGA membership third party liability insurance has been canceled temporally or until a new policy can be negotiated. All members are still insured while participating in any club function or activity. The rate jumped 2000%, presumably as a result of Sept. 11th.
- A survey on Catch & Release fishing of Walleye on Lesser Slave Lake indicated that of 558,000 fish release, 2800 died or 5 %.
- Tournament mortality of Walleye from + 18 deg water was 35%, and from cooler water - less than 18 deg was 11%.
- Walleye stocking survival is not great. The very best is a 50% survival rate. Stocking in Sylvan, Pine Coulee and Savn Lake showed a survival rate of 0 to 10%.
- It is estimated that there are 650 brown trout in the Bow River.
- Fish plant program require 1 million walleye eggs this year for re-stocking.
- There were 98000 hunters who purchases licenses in 2001.
- The Ministry is reducing commercial fishing licenses from 800 to 200 in 2002. This does not apply to Treaty Indians.
- In 2001 we had 136 conservation officers in the field.

Habitat News

Several things have happened in this and related areas since our last Newsletter was published.

Thanks to Rob Hume and his two boys Thomas and Kevan we cut out 24 large duck boxes. With the help of children attending the Sportsman's Show 18 of these have been assembled. George Loades again came through with a prodigious effort and 175 Bluebird boxes were similarly assembled at the Show. There still remains a good deal to do to get these boxes completed and painted before they can be installed. I took two completed duck boxes to the Annual conference and they added \$20.00 each to the AFGA funds, through the Silent Auction.

Just recently I received approval for the project to plant 1800 Caraganas on the Greg Hawkwood ranch North East of Cochrane. We will need some volunteers to plant these in late April or early May.

HIDE AND SHED ANTLER COLLECTION PROGRAM

Our 2000 program saw 561 hides contributed to the program. It looked as if the 2001 would produce exactly the same number but after what I concluded was the last shipment 9 more came in from Rocky Mountain House to raise our total to 570. And the great news is that one of the seven brought in by Jim McConnel of Calgary won a rifle, scope and sling for him. The other two rifles were won by Wally Purcell of Bonnyville and Rick Kobyluk of Edmonton. I hope shortly, to have five more small prizes to offer to those who contributed hides based on a prize per 100 for those collected by our club.

Our Shed Antler program received 96 Sheds and five were drawn for prizes. William Eckert won two prizes, a Shakespear Folding camp chair and Truis Birdshooter Clay Target Trap. Greg Hawkwood won a Simmons Deerfield Rifle Scope. Art Martens won a Mini Maglite. Leroy Heuther won a G-Man Bagsag Bow Saw and a pair of Camp/USA Game Shears.

The muzzle loading rifle for the largest shed was won by Rick Chalifoux.

THE ANNUAL ALBERTA FISH AND GAME ASSOCIATION CONFERENCE FEB. 21-23

From February 21-24, 2001, it was my honor to represent the Sarcee Fish and Game Association alongside Art Beck, Dale Lucas, Gene Kulsky, Art Yeske and Bryce Chase at the Annual Conference of the Alberta Fish and Game Association in Edmonton. The theme to this years conference was "Our Natural Heritage is our Future" was most fitting to the issues being discussed. The weekend kicked off with an opening prayer from our President, Rod Dyck. Afterwards, the executive of AFGA was introduced and a conference overview was given. The sessions began with the environment report from AFGA's environment chair, Ruth Harrison. She introduced speakers who spoke on their particular work. After Ruth, the delegates heard from Grant Creasy who is programs chair for AFGA. He brought in Kelly Semple who talked about the newly formed Hunting For Tomorrow Foundation who's main objective's are to recruit new hunters, keep the present hunters and promote hunting and it's culture to all Albertans. AFGA is one of the many conservation groups involved in this new initiative. The delegates then heard from Glen Walushka who developed a membership program for AFGA to simplify and computerize membership information. Valued at \$12 000, this program was made available to all AFGA member clubs for free through a generous donation from the Lacombe Fish and Game Association. Our membership chairman is currently looking into this revolutionary program. Once the sessions for the day were concluded, all delegates and companions shared a fun filled night at the zone meet and greet. Friday began with the fisheries presentation from the AFGA fishing chair Vern MacIntosh who also brought in many guest speakers. The Honourable Mike Cardinal, Minister of Sustainable Resource Development, then addressed the delegates on the issues we are facing and plans for the future. Following his presentation all the conference participants had lunch courtesy of the Minister, and then returned to the sessions for hunting reports and an ACA info session. Friday night was highlighted by the Sunpine Dinner and a silent auction was held. Saturday began with some more fishing sessions and then proceeded on to the annual general meeting of AFGA. After lunch, the conference resolution sessions were held, this proved to be quite an interesting afternoon. One resolution that was highly debated was whether or not AFGA should remain part of the ACA, the decision was to stay on board. I had an opportunity to meet with other youth coordinators from around the province to brainstorm on ideas in getting more youth involved in hunting and fishing. It was a real value to be able to discuss projects and ideas with other fish and game clubs. Again this year, the highlight of the conference was the Presidents Banquet. Led by a bag piper, the executive of AFGA entered the hall to commence an entertaining evening of dinner, awards and dancing. As Bryce Chase mentioned, our club did very well with the awards. One thing that I noticed the same from last year's conference is the friendship which you can develop with anyone in Fish and Game. At the Presidents Banquet, due to limited seating, I ended up sitting at a table with no one I knew and within a few minutes, it seemed as if everyone had known each other for years. There is a great friendship and shared love for the outdoors that binds us together in our efforts to protect our resources.
